No third term for him as the party president," Koizumi, who was prime minister from 2001 to 2006, said in an interview published by a weekly magazine of April 2018. The LDP, which has been in power for all but five of the years since it was formed in 1955, changed its rules last year to allow leaders to seek a third term at the helm. At the time, Abe seemed a to serve until 2021, which would make him Japan's longest-serving prime minister and give him a chance to pursue some of his controversial goals. But in the ensuing months, he has been plagued by a cronyism scandal that won't go away but has not been damning enough to topple him.

Despite an apparent blip over the scandal, Abe enjoys approval keeping. Opposition to his LDP-led government remains fragmented and weak, and Abe has a two-thirds supermajority in the Diet that gives him a powerful base. His support rate is unlikely to fall, but Abe is still likely to survive the scandal by saying “This was done by finance ministry bureaucrats.” Abe is seeking re-election as head of the LDP in September, and a win would set him on course to become Japan’s longest-serving leader. For the moment, no strong opponent or challenger has emerged, but the scandal could damage Abe at a time when the hawkish leader wants to make contentious changes to the Constitution while dealing with the North Korea nuclear crisis.
